In March 2020:

- Air & sea arrivals were down 59.7% for the month and 14.7% 2020 YTD.
- Stopover arrivals were down 69.7% for the month and 34.5% for 2020 YTD.
- Cruise arrivals were down 59.6% for the month of March and down 10.0% for 2020 YTD.

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Total Visitor Arrivals

In March 2020, The Bahamas received **302.1K** foreign air and sea arrivals, a decline of **59.7%** relative to March 2019, but air arrivals to the Bahamas as a whole declined by **62.5%** and stood at **75.7K**.

Air arrivals during the month were down in all of the major islands: Nassau/Paradise Island (-60.2% to 60.9K), Grand Bahama (-74.0% to 1.9K), Abaco (-90.1% to 1.5K), Andros (-58.0% to 480), Berry Islands (-46.1% to 724), Bimini (-58.7% to 978), Cat Cay (-51.7% to 226), Cat Island (-46.8%), Eleuthera (down significantly), Exuma (-58.7% to 3.5K), Inagua (-18.6%), Long Island (-30.1%), and San Salvador (-61.7% to 690).

In March 2020, stopover arrivals were **66.8K**, a 69.7% decrease compared to March 2019. This reflects decreased stopover arrivals to all major island destinations in the Bahamas like Abaco (-97.5%), Andros (-77.4%), Berry Islands (-

57.8%), Bimini (-77.1%), Grand Bahama (-89.6%), Mainland Eleuthera (-87.1%), Harbour Island (-85.6%), and San Salvador (-94.8%) and decreased arrivals from most source markets.

By the end of March YTD, stopovers from most of the islands in the Bahamas had been influenced by the month of March and were down for the period.

In March 2020 YTD, average hotel occupancy for large hotels on Nassau/Paradise Island was

63.2%, down 14.8% percentage pts. from 2019, while average daily room rates were down 9.3% to \$273.57 contributing to a 28.0% decline in hotel room revenues.

Meanwhile, cruise arrivals were down 10% **in March 2020 YTD** to 1.3M.






Stopover Arrivals (March YTD)

From January to March 2020, The Bahamas received **343.4K** stopovers, (down 34.5% compared to the same period in 2019).

This reflects decreases in stopovers from the United States (down 35.6%), Canada (down 22.2%), Europe (down 37.3%), Latin America (down 35.5%), Caribbean (down 27.4%), Asia (down 59.1%), Africa (down 34.2%), Australasia (down 33.1%) and the Middle East (down 16.0%) for


January to March YTD.

For the year to date, **78.3%** of stopover visitors (**268.8K**) originated from the United States, while **11.8%** (**40.6K**) originated from Canada, **6.4%** (**21.8K**) from the Caribbean, **1.65%** (**5.7K**) from Latin America, and **1.0%** (**3.6K**) from the rest of the world.

North American Arrivals

United States

In March 2020, **54.9K** stopover arrivals were received from the United States, a decrease of **70.1%**, compared to March 2019.

In this regard, arrivals from all sales territories across the US declined, including: the Northeast (down 63.6% to 21.4K), the Midwest (down 70.9% to 17.2K), the Southeast (down 70.1% to 6.5K), and Florida (down 79.1% to 7.0K).

In March 2020 YTD the top 10 producing states were New York (down 25.6%), Florida (down 48.3%), Massachusetts (down

19.6%), New Jersey (down 26.4%), Texas (down 38.8%), Pennsylvania (down 29.1%), California (down 35.3%) Georgia (down 37.5%), Illinois (down 43.5%), and Virginia (down 28.8%).

The top ten DMAs during the period were: New York, Boston (Manchester), Miami-Ft. Lauderdale, Washington DC (Hagerstown), Philadelphia, Atlanta, Chicago, West Palm Beach-Ft. Pierce, Los Angeles, and Dallas-Ft. Worth.

Canada

In March 2020, **6.99K** stopover arrivals were received from Can-

ada, a decrease of **65.1%**, compared to March 2019.

In March 2020 YTD, the top five producing provinces for stopovers were: Ontario (down 23.4%), Quebec (down 14.4%), Alberta (down 18.7%), British Columbia down 21.1%), and Manitoba (down 17.7%).

The top ten producing cities YTD were: Toronto, Montreal, Mississauga, Ottawa, Calgary, Oakville, Brampton, London. Hamilton and Burlington.

In March, European arrivals were down 69.1% for the month and 37.3% YTD.

European Arrivals


In March 2020, **3.3K** stop-over arrivals were received from European countries, a decrease of **69.1%**, compared to March 2019.

In March 2020, stopover arrivals from all sales territories across Europe were down, including: the UK, covering Italy, Netherlands, and the Nordic region (down by 66.4%); France, covering Spain, Belgium, Portugal, Luxembourg, Monaco and Andorra (down 78.5%); and Germany, covering Central and Eastern Europe (down 66.6%).

By the end of March YTD, the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors 2020 were: the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Poland, Spain, Netherlands, Russia, and Romania.

The top ten producing cities were: London, Paris, Rome, Moscow, Portland, Munich, Milan, Hamburg, Stockholm, Vienna and Constanta.

Latin American & Caribbean Arrivals

Latin America

In March 2020, **611** stopover arrivals were received from Latin American countries, a decrease of **73.2%** compared to March 2019.

By the end of March YTD the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors during the period were: Brazil, Argentina, Mexico, Columbia, Chile, Panama, Peru, Venezuela, Ecuador and Uruguay

The top ten producing cities were: Sao Paulo, Buenos Aires,

Rio de Janeiro, Santiago, Panama City, Bogota, Mexico City, Lima, Guatemala City, and Cancun.

The Caribbean

In March 2020, **491** stopover arrivals were received from Caribbean countries, a decrease of **69.3%**, compared to March 2019.

By the end of March YTD, the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors were: Jamaica, Trinidad and Tobago, Turks and Caicos, Cayman Islands, Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, Barbados, Bermuda, Cuba, and Haiti.

The top ten producing cities were: Kingston, Lucea, George Town, Montego Bay, St. Catharines, West Bay, Spanish Town, Port of Spain, Havana, Guaynabo, and East End.

Arrivals from the Rest of the World

Asia

In March 2020, **171** stopover arrivals were received from Asian countries, a decrease of **83.4%** compared to March 2019. **1.6K** Asian visitors were received by March 2020 YTD, a 59.1% decrease from the same period in 2019.

The top ten producing countries for stopover visitors for March 2020 YTD were: China, Philippines, India, Japan, South Korea, Hong Kong, Singapore, Indonesia, Armenia, and Thailand.

The top ten producing cities were: Shanghai, Beijing, Caba, Seoul, Mumbai, Tokyo, Shenzhen, Xi'an, Bengaluru and Baku.

Australasia

In March 2020, **172** stopover arrivals were received from

Australasian countries, a decrease of **57.3%** compared to March 2019.

The top three producing countries for stopover visitors in March 2020 YTD were: Australia, New Zealand, and Fiji.

Africa

In March 2020, **90** stopover arrivals were received from African countries, a decrease of **76.1%** compared to March 2019.

The top five producing countries for stopover visitors for March YTD 2020 were: South Africa, Kenya, Morocco, Mauritius, and Nigeria.

The top five producing cities were: Cape Town, Johannesburg, Durban, Pretoria, and Nairobi.

Middle East

In March 2020, **46** stopover arrivals were received from Middle Eastern countries, a decrease of **64.6%** compared to March 2019.

The top five producing countries for stopover visitors for March 2020 YTD were: Israel, United Arab Emirates, Jordan, Saudi Arabia and Qatar.

The top five producing cities were: Dubai, Tel Aviv-Yafo, Abu Dhabi, Ramat Gan, and Irbid.

In March, stopover arrivals from Asia, Australasia, Africa and the Middle East were down for the month and YTD.

Visitor Arrivals By Island

In March 2020, stopover arrivals decreased for all of the destinations in the Bahamas.


During the month, stopover visitor arrivals were down for the following islands: Nassau/ Paradise Island (-63.2% to 58.7K), Grand Bahama (-89.6% to 1.5K), Abaco (-97.5%), Berry Islands (-57.8% to 152 visitors), Bimini (-77.1% to 1.4K), Mainland Eleuthera (-87.1%), Harbour Island in Eleuthera (-85.6%), Exuma (-74.3% to 2.8K), and San Salvador (-94.8%).

From January to March 2020, compared to the same period in 2019, Nassau received **279.9K** stopover visitors, a decrease of 26.7%. During the period stopover declines were also noted on other Islands like Abaco (down 85.4% to 4.8K), Bimini (down

48.5% to 6.7K), Cat Cay (down 47.6% to 162 visitors), Cat Island (down 51.1% to 414 visitors), Crooked Island (down 52.3% to 53), Exuma (down 31% to 18.1K), Harbour Island Eleuthera (down 44.3% to 3.5K) and San Salvador (down 42.7% to 3.4K).

In March YTD 2020, Nassau was the top island destination for visitors from all source markets, receiving **81.5%** of stopover arrivals, followed by Exuma which had 5.3% and Grand Bahama with 4.4%.

Eleuthera as a whole including Harbour Island had **3.3%** of the market share of stopovers: i.e., Eleuthera mainland with **2.3%** and Harbour Island with **1.0%**. The next biggest destination for stopovers to the Bahamas was Bimini with **2.0%** of the visitors. Abaco



rounded out the top islands for stopovers, with **1.4%** of arrivals.

Travel Trends

From January to March 2020, the average length of stay of stopover visitors to The Bahamas was 6.3 nights with 60.7% staying 4 to 7 nights, 22.3% staying 2 to 3 nights, and 9.0% staying 8 to 14 nights.

Among the main source markets not including Africa (21.3 nts.) visitors from Latin America (8.5 nights), Europe (8.9 nights), and Australasia (12.3 nights) stayed the longest on average, compared to an average stay of 5.8 nights for US visitors.

Mode of Arrival

From January to March 2020, 80.8% of stopover visitors to The Bahamas arrived by commercial airline, 14.7% by private plane, 1.7% by private boat/yacht, and 0.8% by cruise ship. This generally reflects the travel patterns of US visitors.

For other source regions, the proportions of stopover visitors arriving by commercial airline, private plane, private boat and cruise ship varied by degree for each market.

For instance, the top transportation modes used by visitors to come to the Bahamas from:

Canada were commercial airlines (94.8%), private planes (3.5%) and cruise ships (0.7%); Europe were commercial airlines (86.9%), private planes (5.8%) and cruise ships (4.2%); Latin America were commercial airlines (85.2%), private planes (7.5%) and cruise ships (4.3%). The Caribbean were commercial airlines (90.0%), private planes (6.2%) and cruise ships (1.4%). Africa were commercial airlines (67.4%), private yacht/boat (18.0%). and cruise ships (4.3%). Australasia were comtors, or 40.7% of visitors from all regions, were repeat visitors, with the largest proportion of repeat visitors from the main source markets coming from the Caribbean (i.e., 52.9% were repeat visitors), Africa (i.e. 49.4%), the US (i.e., 41.8%) and the lowest from Asia (22.2%).


During the period, 69.1% of all stopover visitors came to The Bahamas primarily for a vacation, with 9.9% coming for weddings and honeymoons, and 7.1% for business.

Roughly nine in ten (87%) of

these visitors stayed in hotels, 2.4% in vacation rentals/ apartments or villas, 2.9% in timeshare properties, 0.8% on private boats and 1.8% with friends and relatives.

The average age of stopover visitors during this period was 41.3 years, with 49.5% of all visitors being between the ages of 25 and 54 years. As such, Generation X and Millennials accounted for 26.4% and 25.7% of visitors, respectively, followed by Baby Boomers (19.9%) and Post-Millennials (17.7%).

As of March, 9.9% of stopover visitors in March 2020, came to The Bahamas primarily for weddings and honeymoons.

mercial airlines (82.1%), private yacht/boat (6.7%), and private plane (4.5%). Asia were commercial airlines (89.0%), private planes (4.4%) and cruise ships (3.9%).

Airlift

In March YTD, the top ten commercial airlines were: American Airlines, Delta Air Lines, JetBlue, United Airlines, Air Canada, Southwest Airlines, WestJet, Bahamasair, Silver Airways and British Airways.

For the US YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors from the Midwest (25.3K), followed by Delta (19.7K) and United (9.7K). Delta delivered the most visitors from the Northeast (25.7K), followed by American (25.0K) and Jetblue (22.1K). Delta delivered the most visitors from the Southeast (11.8K), followed by American (8.7K) and Southwest Airlines (1.4K). JetBlue delivered the most visitors from Florida (7.7K), followed by American (6.6K) and Bahamasair (4.8K).


For Canada YTD, Air Canada delivered the most stopover visitors (16.7K) followed by

WestJet (12.4K), and Sunwing (4.9K).

For Europe YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors (5.8K), followed by British Airways (5.1K) and Bahamasair (2.4K).

For Latin America YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors (2.2K), followed by Copa Airlines (768 visitors) and Baha-masair (560 visitors).

For the Caribbean YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors (940 visitors), followed by Caribbean Airlines (733 visitors) and Bahamasair (258 visitors).



In March 2020, cruise arrivals were down 59.6% for the month, and 10.0% YTD. Cruise Arrivals

In March 2020, The Bahamas received 214.0K cruise arrivals by first port of entry, a decrease of 59.6% relative to March 2019.

During the month of March 2020, Bimini which includes Ocean Cay (up significantly to 10.3K) was the only island that experienced an increase in cruise arrivals.

Comparatively at 99.95K cruise visitors, Nassau / Paradise Island was down by 68.9%. Cruise arrivals to all of the fol-

lowing islands were also down during the month of March: Grand Bahama (down 66.6% to 17.4K), Castaway Cay Abaco (down 33.5% to 11.8K), Berry Islands (down 3.9% to 49.3K), Princess Cay Eleuthera (down 69.6% to 13.4K) and Half Moon Cay (down 71.2% to 11.8K) (first port of entry).

Meanwhile, cruise arrivals (first port of entry) March YTD 2020 decreased at a slower pace by 10.0% and stood at 1.3M. Most of the cruise ports experienced declines except the Berry Islands and Bimini for the quarter. Cruise arrivals to the Berry Islands (Great and Little Stirrup Cays) increased significantly by 124.8% to 322.7K during the period. Cruise arrivals to Bimini (namely the cruise port of Ocean Cay) also increased significantly during the period to 63.1K; this port was not open in 1st qtr. 2019.


