Tourism Statistical Review

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Bahamas Ministry of Tourism & Aviation



In July 2021:

- Air & sea arrivals were significantly up 669% for the month and down 65.5% 2021 YTD compared to 2020.
- Stopover arrivals were up 478.9% for the month, and up 27.3% for 2021 YTD compared to the same period of 2020.
- Cruise visitor arrivals to the Bahamas began to return in February 2021. Cruise arrivals were down 65.5% by July 2021 YTD as service had just resumed to the destination during the month of February and most cruise lines had not yet returned in full force.

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Total Visitor Arrivals

In July 2021, The Bahamas received 183.3K foreign air and sea arrivals, a 669.4% increase relative to July 2020. Foreign <u>air</u> arrivals to The Bahamas as a whole increased by 771.4% and stood at 133.8K. At the end of March 2020, The Bahamas had closed its borders to international traffic. In July 2020, The Bahamas officially re-opened to international traffic that were coming by private planes or private boats and remained open for July 2021 for these visitors and the ones that travelled by commercial flights.

Air arrivals to The Bahamas were up significantly between July 2020 and July 2021 as they climbed back up. This increase was seen in all the following islands: Abaco, Andros, Berry Islands, Bimini, Cat Cay, Cat Island, Eleuthera, Exuma, Grand Bahama, Inagua, Long Island, and Nassau/Paradise Island. San Salvador was the only island down in July 2021 because the major hotel for the island, Club Med

was still closed.


In July 2021, <u>stopover arrivals</u> to the Out islands were up significantly during the month compared to the same period of 2020 as visitors flocked to these islands. Stopover arrivals were up in Abaco, Andros, Berry Islands, Cat Island, Exuma, Eleuthera, Harbour Island, and Long Island.

By the end of July YTD 2021, stopovers to San Salvador were down. All of the other islands experienced growth for the period.

At the end of March 2020, most

of the large hotels in Nassau/ Paradise Island closed as a result of the border closures that took effect at that time and opened once again during the month of December 2020. These hotels remained open in July 2021. Hotel Occupancy for these large hotels in July 2021 was 69.9% although some properties had occupancies above 80% during the month.

Meanwhile, cruise arrivals which started again in February 2021 were still down by July 2021 YTD. By July 2021, a few of the cruise lines had resumed service to The Bahamas.




Stopover Arrivals (July YTD)

From January to July 2021, The Bahamas received **498.8K** stopovers (up 27.3% compared to the same period in 2020).

This reflects increases in stopovers from the United States (up 51.1%), Latin America (up 21.4%), Caribbean (up 9.4%), Africa (up 39.4%), and the Middle East (up 2.7%), and decreases in Canada (down 93.4%), Europe (down 69.0%), Asia (down 59.3%), Australasia (down 45.6%) for January

to July YTD.

For the year to date July YTD, 95% (498.8K) of stopover visitors originated from the United States, while 1.43% (7.5K) originated from Europe, 1.55% (8.1K) from Latin America, 0.5% (2.8K) from Canada, 0.7% (3.5K) from the Caribbean, and 0.6% (3.2K) from the rest of the world.

North American Arrivals

United States

In July 2021, **135.2k** stopover arrivals were received from the United States, an increase of 478.9% compared to July 2020.

In this regard, arrivals from all sales territories across the US increased, including: Florida (up 191.4%), the Northeast (up over 1000%), the Midwest (up 752.3%), and Southeast (up 607.4%).

In July 2021 YTD the top 10 producing states were Florida (up 113.3%), New York (up 17.9%), Texas (up 119.1%), California (up 101.5%), New Jersey (up 55.2%), Georgia (up

109.4%), North Carolina (up 74.2%), Pennsylvania (up 10.2%), Massachusetts (down 22.5%), and Virginia (up 35.0%).

The top ten DMAs during the period July YTD were: New York, Miami-Ft. Lauderdale, West Palm Beach-Ft.Pierce, Atlanta, Boston (Manchester), Washington DC (Hagerstown), Orlando-Daytona Bch-Melbrn, Los Angeles, Dallas-Ft. Worth, Tampa-St. Pete, and Philadelphia.

Canada

In July 2021, a small amount of stopover arrivals were received

from Canada but it was an increase of 389.9% compared to July 2020.

In July 2021 YTD, the top five producing provinces for stopovers were: Ontario (down 94.5%), Quebec (down 92.5%), Alberta (down 91.6%), British Columbia (down 92.1%), and Manitoba (down 87.9%).

The top ten producing cities YTD were: Toronto, Mississauga, Calgary, Winnipeg, Dorval, Westmount, Vaughan, Montreal, and Fort McMurray.

In July, European arrivals were up tremendously for the month but down 69.0% July YTD.

European Arrivals

In July 2021, 2.1K stopover arrivals were received from European countries and were up (584.8%) compared to July 2020.


In July 2021, stopover arrivals from all sales territories across Europe were up, including: the UK, covering Italy, Netherlands, and the Nordic region(+700.0%);

Germany, covering Central and Eastern Europe;(+435.6%) and France, covering Spain, Belgium, Portugal, Luxembourg, Monaco and Andorra(+620.0).

By the end of July 2021 YTD, the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors were: the United Kingdom (down 70.3%), France (down 82.2%), Germany

(down 76.1%), Italy (down 74.1%), Switzerland (down 47.6%), Spain (down 31.0%), Netherlands (down 40.0%), Russia (down 52.2%), Poland (down 78.3%) and Denmark (down 63.1%).

The top producing cities were: London, Rome, Paris, Salford, Moscow, Delft, Madrid, Istanbul, Munich, and Liw.



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Latin American & Caribbean Arrivals

Latin America

In July 2021, 2.6K stopover arrivals were received from Latin American countries and increased substantially (502.5%) compared to July 2020.

By the end of July YTD the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors during the period were: Mexico (+122.3%), Brazil (+5.6%), Columbia (+40.8%), Argentina (-52.3%), Peru (+51.0%), Panama (+37.5%), Venezuela (+20.7%), Chile (-39.0%), Guatemala (+51.1%), and Ecuador (+3.1%). The top ten producing cities were: Mexico City, Sao Paulo, Bogota, Lima, Panama City, Merida, Cancun, Buenos Aires, Rio de Janeiro, and Guatemala City.

The Caribbean

In July 2021, stopover arrivals received from Caribbean countries increased substantially (over 1000%) compared to June 2020.

By the end of July YTD, the top producing countries for stopover visitors from the Caribbean were: Jamaica (29.8%), Puerto Rico (+136.8%), Turks and Caicos (+51.4%), Dominican Republic (+34.9%), Cuba (+79.4%), Bermuda (-9.4%), Cayman Islands (-56.5%), Trinidad and Tobago (-83.0%), Barbados (-64.2%), Guyana (+6.3%), and St. Kitts and Nevis (+76.0%).

The top ten producing cities were: Lucea, Kingston, Montego Bay, Guaynabo, Dorado, Spanish Town, Havana, Portmore, George Town and Caguas.

Arrivals from the Rest of the World

Asia

In July 2021, stopover arrivals received from Asian countries, increased compared to July 2020 (+295.8%). A miniscule amount of Asian visitors were received by July 2021 YTD, a -59.3% decrease from the same period in 2020.

The top producing countries for stopover visitors for July 2021 YTD were: Philippines (down 4.1%), India (down 46.8%), China (down 91.8%) Japan (down 79.8%), Hong Kong (down 54.3%), Singapore (down 58.1%), and Indonesia (down 70.0%).

The top producing cities were: Caba, Mumbai, Chas, Cebu City, Pune, Bengaluru, and Yerevan.

Australasia

In July 2021, a small amount of

stopover arrivals were received from Australasian countries, but it saw a 72.5% increase compared to July 2020.

The top producing countries for stopover visitors in July 2021 YTD declined compared to the same period of 2020, Australia (-54.0%) and New Zealand (-10.4%).

Africa

In July 2021, stopover arrivals received from African countries saw no change compared to July 2020.

The top producing countries for stopover visitors for July YTD 2021 were: South Africa (up 53.7%), Burkina Faso, Namibia, Zimbabwe, and Congo.

The top producing cities were: Cape Town (+74.5%), Durban (+53.2), Johannesburg (-11.8%), Pretoria (+66.7%), Port Elizabeth (+163.6%), George (+257.1%), and Knysna (+69.2%).

Middle East

In July 2021, there was increase in stopover arrivals received from Middle Eastern countries (up over 1000%) compared to July 2020.

The top producing countries for stopover visitors for July 2021 YTD were: Israel (up 6.5%), United Arab Emirates (up 19.6%), and Qatar (up 66.7%).

The top producing cities were: Dubai (+44.7%), Doha (+53.8%), Jaffa (+200.%), Abu Dhabi (-41.7%), and Jerusalem (-7.7%).

In July, stopover arrivals from Asia, Australasia, and the Middle East were up for the month but still down for Asia and Australasia by 2021 YTD.

Visitor Arrivals By Island

In July 2021, stopovers to The Bahamas overall were up substantially (+478.9%) compared to July 2020. This was due in part by the desire for visitors to travel again and the relaxation of travel restrictions as more and more people got vaccinated.

During the month, stopover visitor arrivals were up substantially for Nassau/Paradise Island (+919.3%), Exuma (+261.4%), Bimini (+107.6%), Abaco (+243.5%), Grand Bahama (225.2%), Mainland (+177.1%), and Harbour Island Eleuthera (+117.4%) the Berry Islands (+85.4%) and Andros (+9.2%).


From January to July 2021 the following islands experienced increases in stopover visitors: Nassau/Paradise Island received **356.8K** stopover visitors, an in-

crease of 14.4%. Grand Bahama (19.1% to 23.9K), Abaco (+176.9% to 37.2K), Andros (+60.1% to 5.7K), Berry Islands (+209.5% to 4.1K), Bimini (+126.1% to 24.1K), Mainland Eleuthera (+41.8% to 20.0K), Harbour Island Eleuthera (+74.7% to 10.2K), and Exuma (+51.0% to 35.4K stopovers).

During the same period, 2021 YTD, other islands suffered declines in stopovers compared to the same period in 2020. During the period, stopover declines were noted on San Salvador (-66.9% to 1.5K).

In July YTD 2021, Nassau was the top island destination for visitors from all source markets, receiving **68.1%** of stopover arrivals, followed by Abaco (7.1%), Exuma (6.8%), Total Eleuthera

5.7% (i.e. mainland Eleuthera 3.8% and Harbour Island 1.9% of the market share of stopovers), Bimini

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Travel Trends

From January to July 2021, the average length of stay of stopover visitors to The Bahamas was 7.1 nights with 58.3% staying 4 to 7 nights, 18.2% staying 2 to 3 nights, 12.5% staying 8 to 14 nights and 3.2% staying 22-90 nights.


Among the main source markets not including Africa (29.7 nts.) visitors from Australasia (27.8 nts.), Asia (18.7 nts.), Europe (16.0 nts.), the Caribbean (10.2 nts.), and Latin America (9.3 nts.), stayed the longest on average, compared to an average stay of 6.8 nights for US visitors.

During this period, 48.0% of visitors from all regions, were repeat visitors, with the largest proportion of repeat visitors from the main source markets coming from Africa (80.2%), Australasia (64.1%), Canada (63.8%), USA (48.0%), Europe (46.4%) and the Caribbean (46.1%). The region with the lowest repeat visitor rate in the period was The Middle East (27.4%).

During the period, 70.1% of all stopover visitors came to The Bahamas primarily for a vacation, with 12.6% coming for weddings and honeymoons, and 2.4% for business.

Roughly nine in ten (86.3%) visitors stayed in hotels, 4.3% in vacation rentals/apartments or villas, 3.4% in timeshare properties, 2.3% with friends and relatives, and 1.5% on private boats.

The average age of stopover visitors during this period was 40.3 years, with 42.3% of all visitors being between the ages of 25 and 54 years. As such, Millennials and Generation X accounted for 21.5% and 22.9% of visitors, respectively, followed by Post-Millennials (19.7%) and Baby Boomers (14.0%).



Mode of Arrival

From January to July 2021 YTD, 68.5% of stopover visitors to The Bahamas arrived by commercial airline, 21.3% by private plane, 6.0% by private boat/yacht, and 1.1% by cruise ship. This generally reflects the travel patterns of US visitors.

For other source regions, the proportions of stopover visitors arriving by commercial airline, private plane, private boat and cruise ship varied by degree for each market.

For instance, the top transportation modes used by visitors to come to The Bahamas from:

Canada were commercial airlines (60.5%), private planes (27.6%) and private yachts (7.7%); Europe were commercial airlines (61.4%), private planes (23.6%) and private yachts (9.6%); Latin America were commercial airlines (57.9%), private planes (31.3%) and yachts/boats (5.2%); The Caribbean were commercial airlines (64.8%), private planes (24.9%) and private yacht/boat (3.3%); Africa were commercial airlines (38.9%), private yacht/ boat (39.8%), and private planes (8.4%); Australasia were commercial airlines (45.9%), private yacht/boat (29.1%), and private plane (13.2%); Asia were commercial airlines (58.1%), private planes (23.1%) and yachts/boats (10.3%).

Airlift


In July YTD, the top ten commercial airlines were: American Airlines, Silver Airways, United Airlines, Delta Air Lines, JetBlue, Bahamasair, Air Canada, British Airways and Caribbean Airlines.

For the US YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors from the Midwest (45.4K), followed by Silver Airways (25.0K), and United Airlines (18.0K). American Airlines delivered the most visitors from the Northeast (30.1K), followed by Silver Airways (29.7K) and United Airlines (24.8K). American Airlines delivered the most visitors from the Southeast (19.4K), followed by Silver Airways (18.0K) and Delta (14.4K). Of the commercial airlines, Silver Airways delivered the most visitors from Florida (26.5K), followed by American Airlines (17.2K) and Bahamasair (15.1k).

For Canada YTD, Air Canada delivered the most stopover visitors, followed by Silver Airways and American Airlines. For Europe YTD, British Airways delivered the most stopover visitors followed by Silver Airways and American Airlines. For Latin America YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors, followed by Silver Airlines and COPA Airlines. For the Caribbean YTD, Caribbean Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors, followed by Silver Airways, and American Airlines.

As of July YTD 2021, 12.6% of stopover visitors came to The Bahamas primarily for weddings and honeymoons.

COMMERCIAL AIRLINES AND OTHER TRANSPORTATION YTD



 In February 2021, Balearia the began to bring cruise visitors to The **Bahamas** again and by July 2021 other cruise lines like RCCL, Crystal Cruises, Carnival Cruises, Celebrity Cruises and others had resumed service to the destination.

Cruise Arrivals

In June 2021, The Bahamas received cruise arrivals on the Balearia Caribbean which had resumed service to Bimini and Grand Bahama in February 2021. In addition, Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines resumed service in The Bahamas on June 12, 2021 (Cruise and Maritime Dept. Bahamas Ministry of Tourism, 2021). Moreover, RCCL began homeporting with a few of their ships in The Bahamas during the month of June 2021.

The Bahamas did not receive

any cruise arrivals in April, May, June, August, September, October, November, December 2020 or January 2021 as the Cruise and Ferry Industry had not yet resumed service to The Bahamas.

Cruise arrivals (first port of entry) by July YTD 2021 were still down significantly by 97.0% but Royal Caribbean Cruise lines, Carnival Cruises, and Celebrity Cruises had once again resumed service to The Bahamas after more than a year of absence due

to the global pandemic, and other cruise lines were also schedule to resume service too in the upcoming months. The Coco Cay port in The Bahamas was now open again.

In addition, Crystal Cruises began service to The Bahamas and made stops on many islands like Nassau, Grand Bahama, Bimini, Exuma, Long Island, and San Salvador.

Most of the cruise ports in The Bahamas had not yet opened for service in the early months of 2021 but slowly began to do so by July 2021.


