### In October 2020:

- Air & sea arrivals were down 98.4% for the month and 70.5% 2020 YTD.
- Stopover arrivals were down 95.6% for the month and 74.2% 2020 YTD.
- There were no cruise arrivals to The Bahamas in October 2020. Cruise arrivals were down by 69.6% for October 2020 YTD.

### Total Visitor Arrivals

In October 2020, The Bahamas received 7.6K foreign air and sea arrivals, a decline of 98.4% relative to October 2019, and foreign air arrivals to the Bahamas as a whole declined by 92.7% and stood at 5.5K. At the end of March 2020, the Bahamas had closed its borders to international traffic. In June 2020, the Bahamas officially reopened to international traffic that were coming by private planes or private boats and remained open for October 2020 for these visitors that travelled this way.

Air arrivals were up in the following islands in October 2020 compared to the same period of 2019: Andros (up 16.4% to 412), Berry Islands (up 17.5%), Cat Cay (up 18.3%), and Cat Island (up 318.2%). In September 2019, Hurricane Dorian passed through the Bahamas.

Air arrivals during the month of October were down in all the following islands: Nassau/Paradise Island (-

96.9% to 2K), Grand Bahama (-37.9%), Abaco (-18.3%), Bimini (-85.4% to 169), Eleuthera (-70.9% to 483), Exuma (-90.3% to 361), Long Island (down 26.7%), and San Salvador (-99.6%), the major hotel on island was still closed in October).


In October 2020, stopover arrivals were down 95.6% compared to October 2019. This reflects decreased stopover arrivals to most major island destinations in the Bahamas like Abaco (-97.3%), Andros (-77.9%), Bimini (-82.9%), Exuma (94.4%), Grand Bahama (-

97.2%), Mainland Eleuthera (-91.5%), Harbour Island (-99.1%), and Nassau/Paradise Island (96.5%), and decreased arrivals from all source markets. The Berry Islands saw an increase in stopovers during the month (+10.4%).

By the end of October YTD, stopovers to all of the islands in the Bahamas were down significantly for the period.

At the end of March 2020, most of the large hotels in Nassau/Paradise Island closed as a result of the border closures that took effect at that time and only a couple were open during the month of October 2020.

### Stopover Arrivals by Month




### Stopover Arrivals (October YTD)

From January to October 2020, The Bahamas received **400.2K** stopovers, (down 74.2% compared to the same period in 2019).


This reflects decreases in stopovers from the United States (down 74.7%), Canada (down 61.6%), Europe (down 76.9%), Latin America (down 78.1%), Caribbean (down 82.6%), Asia (down 82.2%), Africa (down 69.8%), Australasia (down 75.4%) and the Middle East (down 79.5%) for

January to October YTD.

For the year to date, 80.2% of stopover visitors (320.9K) originated from the United States, while 10.5% (41.9K) originated from Canada, 5.8% (23.3K) from Europe, 0.8% (3.3K) from the Caribbean, 1.7% (6.7K) from Latin America, and 1.0% (4.1K) from the rest of the world.

### North American Arrivals

### **United States**

In October 2020, 2.9**K** stopover arrivals were received from the United States, a decrease of **97.8%**, compared to October 2019.

In this regard, arrivals from all sales territories across the US declined, including: the Northeast (down 97.8%), the Midwest (down 96.3%), the Southeast (down 96.5%), and Florida (down 91.2%).

In October 2020 YTD the top 10 producing states were Florida (down 77.6%), New York (down 72.4%), Massachusetts (down 60.9%), Texas (down 81.1%),

New Jersey (down 76.6%), Pennsylvania (down 74.1%), California (down 80.7%) Georgia (down 77.7%), Illinois (down 72.7%), and Virginia (down 74.1%).

The top ten DMAs during the period October YTD were: New York, Miami-Ft. Lauderdale, Boston (Manchester), West Palm Beach-Ft. Pierce, Washington DC (Hagerstown), Philadelphia, Atlanta, Chicago, Orlando-Daytona Bch-Melbrn, and Los Angeles.

### Canada

In October 2020, a miniscule amount of stopover arrivals were received from Canada, a de-

crease of **99.3%**, compared to October 2019.

In October 2020 YTD, the top five producing provinces for stopovers were: Ontario (down 64.2%), Quebec (down 54.0%), Alberta (down 55.2%), British Columbia (down 59.0%), and Manitoba (down 47.5%).

The top ten producing cities YTD were: Toronto, Montreal, Mississauga, Ottawa, Calgary, Oakville, Brampton, London, Hamilton and Burlington.

### European Arrivals

In October 2020, a miniscule amount of stopover arrivals were received from European countries, a decrease of **98.0%**, compared to October 2019.


In October 2020, stopover arrivals from all sales territories across Europe were down, including: the UK, covering Italy, Netherlands, and the Nordic

region (down by 98.1%); France, covering Spain, Belgium, Portugal, Luxembourg, Monaco and Andorra (down 98.8%); and Germany, covering Central and Eastern Europe (down 97.3%).

By the end of October YTD, the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors 2020 were: the United Kingdom, France, Ger-

many, Italy, Switzerland, Spain, Poland, Netherlands, Russia, and Romania.

The top ten producing cities were: London, Paris, Rome, Moscow, Portland, Munich, Hamburg, Milan, Vienna, and Stockholm.

### Latin American & Caribbean Arrivals

### Latin America

In October 2020, a miniscule amount of stopover arrivals were received from Latin American countries, a decrease of **90.3%** compared to October 2019.

By the end of October YTD the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors during the period were: Brazil, Mexico, Argentina, Columbia, Chile, Panama, Peru, Venezuela, Ecuador and Uruguay.

The top ten producing cities were: Sao Paulo, Buenos Aires,

Mexico City, Santiago, Rio de Janeiro, Panama City, Bogota, Lima, Cancun, and Guatemala City.

### The Caribbean

In October 2020, a miniscule amount of stopover arrivals were received from Caribbean countries, a decrease of **95.4%**, compared to October 2019.

By the end of October YTD, the top ten producing countries for stopover visitors from the Caribbean were: Jamaica, Trinidad and Tobago, Turks and Caicos, Cayman Islands, Puerto Rico, Dominican Republic, Barbados, Bermuda, Cuba, and Haiti.

The top ten producing cities were: Kingston, Lucea, George Town, Montego Bay, St. Catharines, Guaynabo, West Bay, Spanish Town, Port of Spain, Havana, and East End.

### Arrivals from the Rest of the World

### Asia

In October 2020, a miniscule amount of stopover arrivals were received from Asian countries, a decrease of **95.7%** compared to October 2019. **1.7K** Asian visitors were received by October 2020 YTD, a 82.2% decrease from the same period in 2019.

The top ten producing countries for stopover visitors for October 2020 YTD were: China, Philippines, India, Japan, South Korea, Hong Kong, Singapore, Indonesia, Thailand and Armenia.

The top ten producing cities were: Shanghai, Beijing, Caba, Mumbai, Seoul, Tokyo, Shenzhen, Cebu City, Xi'an, and Shenyang.

### Australasia

In October 2020, a miniscule

amount of stopover arrivals were received from Australasian countries, a decrease of **93.8%** compared to October 2019.

The top producing countries for stopover visitors in October 2020 YTD were: Australia, and-New Zealand.

### Africa

In October 2020, a miniscule amount of stopover arrivals were received from African countries, a decrease of **80.8%** compared to October 2019.

The top five producing countries for stopover visitors for October YTD 2020 were: South Africa, Kenya, Morocco, Mauritius, and Nigeria.

The top five producing cities were: Cape Town, Durban, Johannesburg, Pretoria, and Nairobi.

### Middle East

In October 2020, a miniscule amount of stopover arrivals were received from Middle Eastern countries, a decrease of **97.6%** compared to October 2019.

The top six producing countries for stopover visitors for October 2020 YTD were: Israel, United Arab Emirates, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Qatar.

The top six producing cities were: Dubai, Tel Aviv-Yafo, Abu Dhabi, Ramat Gan, Doha and Irbid.

In October, stopover arrivals from Asia,
Australasia, Africa and the Middle East were down for the month and YTD.

### Visitor Arrivals By Island

In October 2020, stopover arrivals decreased for most of the destinations in the Bahamas.

During the month, stopover visitor arrivals were down for the following islands: Nassau/Paradise Island (-96.5%), Grand Bahama (-97.2%), Abaco (-97.3%), Mainland Eleuthera (-91.5%), Harbour Island in Eleuthera (-99.1%), and Exuma (-94.4%).


The Berry Islands (10.4%) experienced an increase in stopovers during the month.

From January to October 2020, compared to the same period in 2019, Nassau received **310.6K** stopover visitors, a decrease of 73.3%. During the period stopover declines were also noted on other Islands like Abaco (down 88.8% to 11.3K), Bimini (down

73.7% to 11.7K), Cat Island (down 66.8% to 702 visitors), Crooked Island (down 70.4% to 69), Exuma (down 68.2% to 21.2K), Harbour Island Eleuthera (down 65.6% to 5.6K) and San Salvador (down 67.7% to 4.9K).

In October YTD 2020, Nassau was the top island destination for visitors from all source markets, receiving **77.6%** of stopover arrivals, followed by Exuma which had 5.4% and Grand Bahama with 3.7%.

Eleuthera as a whole including Harbour Island had 4.4% of the market share of stopovers: i.e., Eleuthera mainland with 3.0% and Harbour Island with 1.4%. The next biggest destination for stopovers to the Bahamas was Abaco with 2.8% of visitors, and Bimini with 2.9% of the arrivals.

### Travel Trends

From January to October 2020, the average length of stay of stopover visitors to The Bahamas was 7.0 nights with 58.0% staying 4 to 7 nights, 21.6% staying 2 to 3 nights, 10.2% staying 8 to 14 nights and 3.3% staying 22-90 nights.

Among the main source markets not including Africa (27.5 nts.) visitors from Latin America (9.3 nts.), Europe (9.5 nts.), Asia (11.2 nts.) and Australasia (14.9 nts.) stayed the longest on average, compared to an average stay of 6.6 nights for US visitors.

During this period, 45.1% of


visitors from all regions, were repeat visitors, with the largest proportion of repeat visitors from the main source markets coming from the Caribbean (i.e., 54.0% were repeat visitors), Africa (i.e. 61.3%), the US (i.e., 47.0%) and the lowest from Asia (26.0%).

During the period, 68.4% of all stopover visitors came to The Bahamas primarily for a vacation, with 9.9% coming for weddings and honeymoons, and 6.8% for business.

Approximately nine in ten (88.3%) visitors stayed in hotels, 3.4% in vacation rentals/

apartments or villas, 2.8% in timeshare properties, 1.2% on private boats and 2.4% with friends and relatives.

The average age of stopover visitors during this period was 41.3 years, with 48.2% of all visitors being between the ages of 25 and 54 years. As such, Generation X and Millennials accounted for 25.9% and 24.9% of visitors, respectively, followed by Baby Boomers (19.6%) and Post-Millennials (17.6%).



As of October YTD 2020, 9.9% of stopover visitors came to The Bahamas primarily for weddings and honeymoons.

### Mode of Arrival

From January to October 2020 YTD, 82.5% of stopover visitors to The Bahamas arrived by commercial airline, 10.0% by private plane, 3.7% by private boat/yacht, and 2.1% by cruise ship. This generally reflects the travel patterns of US visitors.

For other source regions, the proportions of stopover visitors arriving by commercial airline, private plane, private boat and cruise ship varied by degree for each market.

For instance, the top transportation modes used by visitors to come to the Bahamas from:

Canada were commercial airlines (94.3%), private planes (3.8%) and cruise ships (0.6%); Europe were commercial airlines (85.2%), private planes (6.9%) and cruise ships (4.0%); Latin America were commercial airlines (77.4%), private planes (13.0%) and cruise ships (3.8%): The Caribbean were commercial airlines (85.9%), private planes (8.9%) and cruise ships (1.4%); Africa were commercial airlines (55.4%),private yacht/boat (28.4%), private planes (5.0%), and cruise ships (3.5%); Australasia were commercial airlines (76.9), private yacht/boat (8.8%), and private plane (6.5%); Asia were commercial airlines (85.5%), private planes (6.0%) and cruise ships (3.9%).

### Airlift

In October YTD, the top ten commercial airlines were: American Airlines, Delta Air Lines, JetBlue, United Airlines, Air Canada, Silver Airways, Bahamasair, Southwest Airlines, WestJet, and Sunwing Airlines.

For the US YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors from the Midwest (26.99K), followed by Delta (20.2K) and United (10.1K). American Airlines delivered the most visitors from the Northeast (26.2K), followed by Delta (26.0K) and Jetblue (22.5K). Delta delivered the most visitors from the Southeast (12.3K), followed by American (9.5K) and Silver Airways (1.5K). Of the commercial airlines, JetBlue delivered the most visitors from Florida (8.0K), followed by American (7.4K) and Bahamasair (6.4K).

For Canada YTD, Air Canada


delivered the most stopover visitors (16.9K) followed by WestJet (12.4K), and Sunwing (5.4K).

For Europe YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors (5.97K), followed by British Airways (5.1K) and Bahamasair (2.5K).

For Latin America YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors (2.3K), followed by Copa Airlines (768 visitors) and Bahamasair (649 visitors).

For the Caribbean YTD, American Airlines delivered the most stopover visitors (955 visitors), followed by Caribbean Airlines (777 visitors) and Bahamasair (272 visitors).

### Cruise Arrivals

In October 2020, The Bahamas did not receive any cruise arrivals by first port of entry. The Bahamas did not receive any cruise arrivals in April, May, June, August, September or October and for this reason there was a significant decline by the end of October YTD.

Cruise arrivals (first port of entry) by October YTD 2020 decreased by 69.6% and remained at 1.33M. Most of the cruise ports in the Bahamas experienced declines in cruise arrivals

between January to October 2020 except Bimini. Cruise arrivals to Bimini were still up by October YTD 2020 because of the increase in cruise arrivals to Ocean Cay (cay in Bimini) during the first two months of 2020.

Cruise arrivals to Bimini (namely the cruise port of Ocean Cay) remained at 63.2K by October 2020 YTD. Cruise arrivals to the port were only up October YTD because of the strong performance in the early months of 2020; this port opened at the end

of 2019.


